BOYS TENNIS

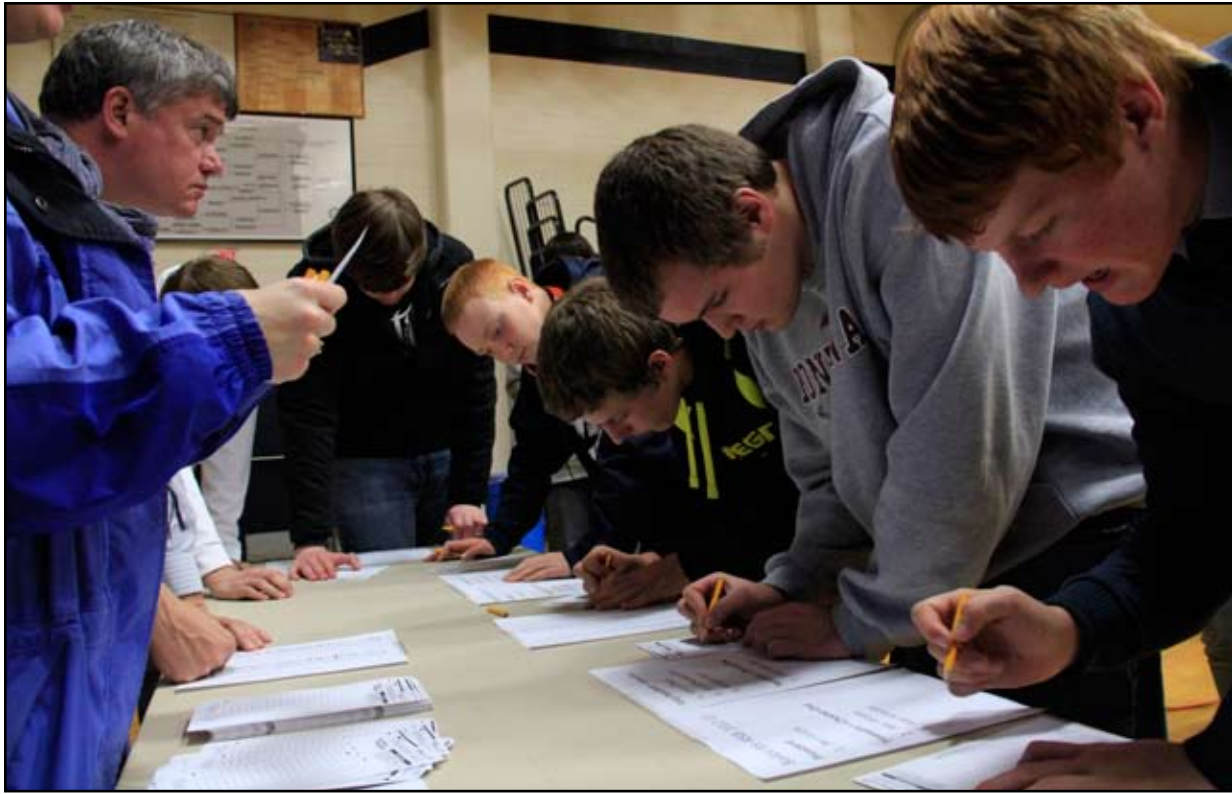

GIRLS TENNIS

Tuesday varsity lost 2-6 at home against Sheldon. Thursday at home they beat North Eugene 7-0. The team was led by junior Madeline Balderston's No. 1 singles 6-0, 6-0 victory. Tonight they face Willamette at home.

TRACK AND FIELD

Last Saturday at the first ever Marist Invitational, senior Taylor Walcott won the 100m and was on the winning 4x100 along with juniors Austin Baird, Colton Bloom, and senior Chris Boyce. In addition, Baird set the Marist triple jump record with a jump of 45 feet 1 1/2 inches. Sophomore Emily Hollander won the 800m while junior Monica Anderson cruised to first place in the 3000m. Wednesday the boys team won the three-way meet against North Eugene and Sheldon JV. Four individuals won races including Walcott (100m), sophomore JP Kiefer (800m), junior Coleman Byrum (110m Hurdles), and senior Jordan Christian (3000m).
