Last Friday at Springfield High School, the boy's track and field team claimed first place at the Midwestern district meet.

After the first day of competition, the team was in second place led by a trio of victories from sophomores Liam Henshaw and JP Kiefer and a win from junior Austin Baird.

Friday brought a new set of challenges that the Spartans were ready to conquer. The day got off to a good start when juniors Austin Baird and Colton Bloom along with seniors Taylor Walcott and Andre Post took first in the 4x100m.

The team started racking up points in the races that followed. Walcott went on to win the 100m and the

200m which marked his third straight district championship in each of those events.

Propelled by an impressive kick, Bloom went on to win the 400m. In the 300m hurdles, junior Coleman Byrum edged out sophomore Henshaw by a tenth of the second to place second and third respectively.

After it was announced that the team won, Coach Pat Wagner was “legitimately surprised” about the victory. “It was punch, counterpunch between us and Marshfield,” said Wagner. “They would get two guys to go 1, 2 in the 1500... then we would come back in the sprints.”

The team competes this weekend at the State meet at Hayward Field.
