One of Marist's most defining structures has been turned off. The fountain—the centerpiece of the courtyard and location of the famous kissing of the M—has temporarily ceased its water flow until an electrical issue can be fixed.

A recent problem with the power box that required repair resulted in the fountain becoming against Eugene city code.

Since the fountain was first

built, the city has allowed it to maintain its current structure, adhering to 1968 city codes; however, after the recent change, the fountain must now comply with current guidelines.

Marist is now in the process of transferring the power system outside of the fountain, which will enable its water flow to return. They aim to finish before a freshman event in May or, at the latest, graduation.
