SAT Class Underway

In preparation for the November 2nd SAT exam, twelve students began meeting twice a week this Tuesday under the instruction of math teacher Amber Patterson and literature teacher Andy Oldham.

Patterson, who has been involved with the program for seven years, educates students on how the math test is structured and provides helpful strategies.

Senior Maureen Pappin felt the course was very helpful, "the class gave me confidence in my test taking skills."

Oldham, who began leading the program nine years ago, informs students test basics, teaches to write an essay in 25 minutes and administers practice SAT tests on weekends. He believes class participants are more prepared for the real test and believes it is reflected in a score increase of 200-300 points.

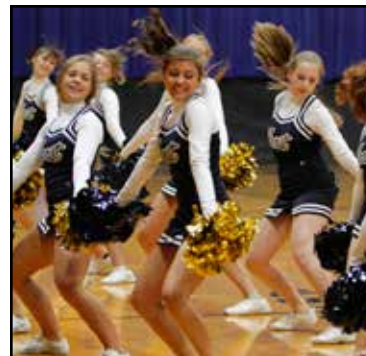

Science teacher June Miller and her ecology class have officially adopted a Eugene City Park Pathway behind the school to help the city keep invasive plant species, particularly the non-native blackberries, under control.

The class will focus on getting rid of the dangerous blackberries, which

are a major problem in Oregon in that they have been known to choke out many types of plants.

As a group the students will be collecting data on the Willamette River's bugs, water and plants. The class will be going out every block day to watch and observe the changes of the vegetation they plant.
