After counting the diapers, the students themselves delivered them to 1st Way in downtown Eugene. "My hope is that some students will go and do some service hours at 1st Way," theology teacher and moderator of Marist for Life Heidi Susec said.

In its fifth year, the number of diapers has nearly doubled from only two years ago.

Several improvements have been made to the back of the Marist Residence thanks to Marist math teacher and boys' soccer team manager Amber Patterson, to benefit the boys and girls soccer and lacrosse teams, including a much needed water fountain.

This past summer, Patterson organized several skilled parents who devoted about five solid days to working on the project. Several Marist parents began work on the facility in 2013 to include bag storage, rest rooms, and a covered outdoor porch. Previously, a shambled shed stood as the sole storage area for supplies. Two benches now sit on the covered concrete pad.

The group also laid a gravel path last summer to prevent the buildup of mud as players walk across from the residence to the service road.

Marist community gathers to celebrate the first mass of the year

Two Marist grads "returned home" to the Holy Dome this Tuesday to draw the Marist community together in celebration of the first all-school mass of the year, the annual Mass of the Holy Spirit.

Fr. David Jaspers '95 of St. Alice Parish in Springfield and Fr. John Kerns '77 of Our Lady of the Lake Parish in Lake Oswego were accompanied by Fr. Peter Do of the Newman Center, Fr. David Brown of St. Paul, and retired Marist chaplain Fr. David Cullings in the presiding over the Mass.

During his homily, Fr. Kerns told a story from his musically-enriched time at Marist, in which he found himself running across the gym floor during a performance of the National Anthem, in which he had a cymbal solo. His central theme was that each of us have an

important "part to play" in God's creation, even if as small as his role on the cymbals, adding that "the Mass is full of cymbalism."

The Mass of the Holy Spirit, a tradition within the Catholic Church, invokes the Holy Spirit upon the beginning of a new pursuit. Fittingly, as noted by Marist Principle Jay Conroy, a bird which had flown into the gym perched was on a wire throughout the ser-

vice.

Freshman received an introduction to the Mass this Monday when former Marist chaplain Fr. Cullings, returned to present Mass etiquette freshman theology classes in the Chapel.

"He covered the basics: why we stand, why we sit," freshman Connor White said of Fr. Cullings presentation. "I understood most of it but it was helpful."
