Hood Community College Aquatic Center in Gresham last Friday and Saturday. The girls team placed 8th out of 16 teams and none of the five boys sent to state placed in the finals.

Sophomore Rachel Larsen finished 5th in the finals of the 50 yard freestyle race and 4th in the 100 yard freestyle. Junior Marissa Gibson finished 6th in the 500 yard freestyle.

The relay team of freshmen Amanda Allender and Jaclyn McQuaid, along with Larsen and Gibson, finished 4th 400 yard freestyle relay.

Gibson said that just being there was a good experience. "Our team is just one big family, and the team aspect gets us through big events like these. It was the best state meet I've been to out of the three," she said.
