A.L.I.C.E. Training Can Save Lives

Representatives from the Eugene Police Department taught the Marist staff the new ALICE training, which ensures the safety of themselves and others in the case of an intruder in the school.

ALICE stands for Alert, Lockdown, Inform, Counter, and Evacuate. The past procedure for this situation was for students to turn lights off and find a safe out-of-sight place which has been discovered

to leave people, students, and teachers more vulnerable to attacks

In the new ALICE procedure, staff learned and will soon “teach” the students to barricade any entrances to the classroom and try to create confusion for the attacker by throwing anything they can, yelling, or attacking.

“There was a good response from parents. There were parents that had heard of it that had spoken highly of it and they

were excited that it was being brought to Marist, though it isn’t a very fun thing to talk about,” Dean of students Kristi Nicholson said.

The police officers created six different dangerous simulations for the teachers to practice. The results of the simulations taught the staff the highest survival rate was when ALICE was used more than when the traditional procedure, as the police described it, “sitting ducks.”
