Grant Gilchrist and Krista Hocker's Algebra 2/Trigonometry classes invited financial planner and friend of Gilchrist Dominic Corletto to teach about financial responsibility on Tuesday.

Corletto highlighted five key principles of finance: spend less than you make, avoid debt, maintain savings, liquidity, and margin, plan for the future, and live generously because God owns it all.

For each principle, Corletto included an applicable Bible verse to relate finance to the Christian lifestyle.

Corletto also discussed the importance of investing early and patiently allowing interest to grow your savings, with an example of two twins, one who invested early and allowed interest to increase

his savings by over 30 fold, while the other twin waited and although he invested more money, only increased his savings by seven fold.

Students were introduced to retirement funds, both 401ks and Individual Retirement Accounts. With IRAs, Corletto explained to students the differences between Traditional IRA and the Roth IRA and the tax benefits of both. He also encouraged students to start contributing to a retirement fund early in life, so, as he put it, they do not become a slaves to their job as they grow older.
