Both teams win districts and send 22 athletes to state

Day two of the Midwestern District Meet began at Eagle Point High School with rain and anticipation for the Marist track and field teams. At the end of the day, Marist had won two district championship trophies and 10 boys and seven girls were added to the list of competitors for the state meet at Hayward Field this Friday and Saturday as well as five alternates.

Qualifying for state were senior Dustin Jones who was 1st in the 200m and the 400m; senior Matt Jones was 1st in the 100m and 2nd in the 200m; sophomore Jerik Embleton was 1st in the 800m and 2nd in the 1500m; senior Austin Korth was 1st in the 110m hurdles and 2nd

in the 300m hurdles; senior Trae Gould was 4th in triple jump; Both relays also took first sending seniors Trevor Coleman, Matt Jones, Ben Hayes and Dustin Jones to state in the 4x100m relay and Jerik Embleton, junior Adam Yarbrough and seniors Clark Embleton and Dustin Jones in the 4x400m relay. Also qualifying for state from Thursday's meet were Nick Grafton in pole vault and senior Ryan Helbling in 3000m.

The girls who qualified for state are sophomore Madelyn Nowicki who was 1st in the 400m and 2nd in the 200m; freshman Rainy Adkins was 2nd in the 400m; sophomore Julia Melendy was 2nd in the 300m hurdles; and senior Kara Mathison was

2nd in long jump. Adkins, Nowicki, sophomore Caitlin Kirk and sophomore Annie McNeil were 2nd in the 4x100m relay and Adkins, Kirk, Nowicki and junior Booy Rogers were 1st in the 4x400 relay.

The boys scored 200 points, which was 55.5 points ahead of 2nd place Crater High School, and the girls scored 135 points just 5.5 points ahead of 2nd place North Eugene.
