The much anticipated Mr. and Ms. Spartan Pageant is finally here, taking place tomorrow night at 7 p.m. in Marist's main gym. After 28 years of crowning just one male Mr. Spartan, this will be the first year that a pair of contestants will be jointly crowned.

After two years of COVID postponement, this year's pageant will be formatted a bit differently. While there will no longer be a specific talent segment, the pageant will feature multiple game-show spoofs with Marist staff members playing the game-show hosts.

"This year's pageant is surprising in the sense that, while it's based on the traditional formula, it takes a new spin on the Pageant," said communications director Natalia Zreliak, who is joining English teacher Bill Ferrari in directing the program.

Multiple participants and leaders have personal connections to the NICU, having had family members or themselves spending

time there as an infant. Zreliak, a 2015 Marist graduate, was a senior coordinator in the program. She was inspired to help raise money for the babies after her nephew spent time in the NICU two years earlier.

Ferrari and his wife Julie, who is a former program coordinator, have had two grandchildren stay in the NICU. "There is no question that the NICU saved Alistair's (Ferrari's grandchild) life". Another one of Ferrari's grandchildren, Joel, also spent time in the NICU.

Leading up to tomorrow's pageant, the Spartan Team organized a dance, a trivia night, and a bowling activity to raise money for Sacred Heart RiverBend's Neonatal Intensive Care Unit. The total amount earned, which will include the ticket sales from the pageant, will be announced at the end of the pageant.

The neon themed dance, which included a 50-50 raffle, made about \$1,600 for the NICU. The Trivia Night had a record

number of participants and student turn-out, and \$900 was raised.

The bowling night took place at Firs Bowling Lanes and had over 80 attendees and made \$1,200. Sophomore Peyton Anderson won the silly costume contest at the event and won free tickets to the Spartan Pageant. Senior Stefan Schroffner won free tickets for the highest student score of 142 points for a single round and history teacher Walt Fox had the highest bowling score of 150 points for a single round.
