Marist community celebrates Mass in honor of our founders

Students and staff gathered in the warm and sunny courtyard on Wednesday morning to worship, remember our founders, and crown Mary at the annual Founder's Day Mass.

Senior Susmitha Helbling opened the Mass with a brief history of the founding of Marist by the Marist Brothers and the Sisters of the Holy Names.

The Mass was celebrated by Fr. Ken Olsen who tied our Marist founders into his homily about the communion of saints who have preceded us and continue to play a role in our lives. As a Catholic who grew up in the St. Mary's Parish and attended St. Francis before en-

tering the Seminary, Olsen shared his fond memories of Msgr. Murnane, who he humorously referred to as the "Red Dean of Eugene." Murnane was the one who saw the need for St. Francis to expand and acquired the land for Marist to be built in 1968.

Following communion, liturgy coordinator Julie Ferrari read a letter from President Suzanne Graf that spoke about the significance of the Founder's Day Mass in the Marist community. For years, this Mass has been an annual tradition for the school and an event that the student body and staff look forward to, and this year something new was added.

The Crowning of Mary was performed at Marist for the first time in the school's history, led by sophomore Sara Weyant. Weyant reflected on the Crowning of Mary from her St. Paul Parish School days as one of her favorite memories. She has asked theology teacher Heidi Susec for a way to introduce the Crowning of Mary to Marist since her freshman year. So after Communion, several students gathered flowers to crown the statue of Mary in the Grotto as Proclaim performed "Ave Maria."

Following the Mass, students were invited to go to the cafeteria to get some free and delicious barbecue provided by Marist.

TRACK
