Marist invites speaker to share second hand experiences of Holocaust with sophomores

This Monday April 29, which marked the 74th anniversary of the liberation of Dachau, guest speaker Clarice Wilsey spoke to the sophomore class about her personal connection to Holocaust history in the Bob Devereux Theatre. She told the story of her late father, Captain David B. Wilsey M.D, who treated survivors of Dachau Concentration Camp.

According to a press release from Marist President Suzanne Graf, after the death of Wilsey's

parents, she found over 300 letters that her father wrote to her mother about his experiences on the front lines of Germany and then in Dachau.

Wilsey's father was one of 27 American physicians who entered Dachau Concentration Camp and gave medical treatment to the survivors.

Coordinator and English teacher Becky Boyd said that the presentation was interesting and made her want to read the letters herself.

The presentation was arranged to compliment the sophomore English classes' unit on the

Holocaust. They are currently reading the novel *Night* by Elie Wiesel, about his survival in Auschwitz, and the class has also viewed the movie *Schindler's List*, which tells the story of Oskar Schindler, an unlikely humanitarian who helped save the lives of 1,200 Jews in WWII.

Wilsey recently retired from the University of Oregon where she served as an administrator and faculty member for over 20 years. She is now on the speaker's bureau for the Oregon Jewish Museum and Holocaust Center for Education.

OSU FIELD TRIP

Marist's AP Chemistry and Physics classes toured the engineering department at Oregon State University last Friday, and got to research the nuclear reactor on campus, even doing a lab on neutron activation to determine its half-life.

For senior AP Physics student Joseph, seeing the reactor was the highlight of the trip. "The fact that they have a nuclear reactor on campus is incredible. They used a fishing rod to lower the samples, not an actual device or grappling hook, it was literally just a fishing pole," Hardt said.

Chemistry and physics teacher Ryan Moser takes students every year so that they can do research they can't do in his classroom.

"We actually get to use their nuclear reactor, put a piece of aluminum in to make the aluminum radioactive and then we measure the radioactivity -- and we don't have any of that equipment [at Marist]. Even if it didn't cost tons of money, we still couldn't have it here so, we just go there to take data and do a lab," Moser said.

Along with the lab, the classes got to watch a video of a reactor pulse, where the reactor shoots out a control rod and glows blue before shutting itself down. "It was a really cool video in addition to just seeing the reactor," senior Brandon Foster said.
