GIRLS SOCCER TAKES SECOND IN STATE

Marist played Woodburn in OSAA 4A State Championship game

Last Saturday, Marist competed in the 4a OSAA state championship game for the first time since 2007 and were hoping for the program's first state championship.

In a fast-paced, non-stop game with the state title on the line, Marist seemed to control the ball for the majority of the time. The final score came down to a lucky toe-tap by Woodburn during a compact play in front of the Marist goal at the 7:20 mark that ended up being the only score of the brisk fall afternoon at Liberty High School in Hillsboro.

The usually prolific Marist offense was suppressed by the Woodburn defense. "They had a sweeper-stopper. They had one girl who cleared every ball; wherever we kicked it, she would run and clear it away. We had to work from the outside in instead of just in the middle," senior co-captain Ella Coulombe said.

After the early goal by the Bulldogs, the Spartans stayed

confident in their teamwork and communication skills and fought to the nail for every possession. According to the Register Guard, Marist led in shots (9-5), they led in shots on goal (5-2), and led in corner kicks (7-2). "This year everything was about the team and everything was about playing for each other and leaving it all out on the field," junior Whitney Korh said.

Coulombe was a clear leader on the team and was awarded Moda Health 2019 Player of the Game for her role as a midfielder. "I think Ella deserved it 100%. I don't think anyone else would've. She definitely was the best leader on the team the whole season. She literally plays every position," Korh said.

Junior Abbie Chambers recounted how Coulombe gave a speech at the end of their game. Though upset, Coulombe told her teammates how proud she was of them and she fully expects to come back and watch them win next year. Chambers said the

moment was touching.

The team only graduates six seniors and, now with state championship experience, the rest of the team is hopeful for upcoming years. "It was fun being there... I'm glad we got up to that point. We wanted to make history but it's okay, another team will," Korh said.

As an added treat to the day of the final game, 2010 grad Macky (Dennis) Hutchison, surprised the team with a message written by herself and three other members of

the 2007 team (Nikki Demers '10, Haley Jaros '10, and Tahne Apo '09) that last made it to the finals.

The letter, read aloud in the Marist theatre before the girls boarded the bus for Hillsboro, told the girls to trust each other as a team. "If you trust each other now, you will later in life," Hutchison read.

"One thing Macky Dennis said was that family means 'forget about me, I love you.' This hit us hard as we really became a family this year," Coulombe said.

FOOTBALL ADVANCES TO SEMIFINALS

The No. 5 Spartans played on the road at No. 4 North Marion in an OSAA 4A quarterfinals match up last Friday.

Wearing white uniforms that by the end were caked in mud, the Spartans fought their way to a hard-earned victory.

Going into the second half, the Spartans led the Huskies 14-8, utilizing a stifling defense and a potent ground game on the offensive end.

All momentum seemed to shift, as the Husky return man found a hole and took the opening second-half kickoff to the house. The following PAT gave the Huskies their first lead of the game, 14-15.

After the Spartans forced a three-and-out, the Huskies were forced to punt. Fielding the punt on the Marist's own 28-yd line, junior Hagan Stephenson dodged defenders to return the punt 72 yards for a touchdown and took the lead back, 21-15.

The fourth quarter didn't start out productive for either team, as there were multiple punts from both sides.

With around three minutes left, the Huskies found the end zone, tying the game at 21, awaiting the PAT. Unfortunately for the Huskies, the kick was blocked by sophomore Kale Paslay, keeping the game tied at 21.

The Spartans retained position on the following kickoff, but were forced to punt. With a chance to put the game out of reach, the Huskies were also stymied, giving the

ball back to the Spartans with a little under a minute left.

Senior quarterback Max Campbell found Stephenson streaking down the sideline for a 28 yard pass to get the Spartans into the red zone. On the ensuing play, sophomore running back Lucas Tuski

garnered his longest run of the evening, an 18 yard rush ending on the one yard line, setting the Spartans up for the game winning touchdown. With eight seconds left, Tuski got another chance, and with a little help from Campbell, pushed his way over the goal line, capping off the game-

winning drive.

With the 28-21 quarterfinals victory, the Spartans earned a rematch with No. 1 Banks in the semifinals. The teams met earlier this year, with Banks prevailing, 14-19.

The semifinal game will take place Saturday at 5:30 p.m. at Hillsboro Stadium.

COUNSELING SERVICES FOR STUDENTS

Marist teams with PeaceHealth to provide mental health services to student body

Starting this week, Marist has partnered with PeaceHealth to provide services for students on campus to meet the growing need for mental health services for youth.

There are two licensed PeaceHealth therapists on campus: Becky Austin on Wednesdays and Chaine Brant on Fridays.

Students who wish to access services with a PeaceHealth therapist on campus can stop by the counseling office or message their counselor for more information. They will need to fill out a simple registration form and have a parent or guardian sign it.

Before therapy begins, students will answer a set of intake,

or mental health assessment questions with either Austin or Brant. Austin prefers a parent or guardian to be at this meeting with the student.

Students should not be concerned about paying for therapy; PeaceHealth's work at Marist is funded by insurance companies, according to Austin.

When asked to describe what the program will do for students, Austin said, "We intend to see students who have either mental health conditions or mental health symptoms who are wanting therapy for whatever reason. We want to provide therapy on sight and during non-instructional hours."

"I'm hoping that most students

that I see here will bring their issues, form a relationship and start addressing those issues," Brant said.

PeaceHealth has committed to serve at Marist until the end of the school year, when it will be evaluated to determine what will be its involvement in the school next year.

They are in need of TETON Sports Regular Sleeping Bags, which can be purchased on Amazon for \$61.85. Any other compact sleeping bag suitable for below freezing temperatures can also be donated. In addition, blankets and 6 x 8 tarps can also be donated.

Marist is also collecting "gently used" winter clothing: coats, hats, scarves, gloves, rain ponchos, etc. that are no longer being used and are in good condition.

Donations can be brought to the front office or to Campus Ministry between Nov. 12-Nov. 22.

15th Night works with the Youth Egan Warming Center, which is open to anybody that needs a place to stay, when it is 30 degrees or below. However there is still a need for sleeping bags because temperature above 30 degrees is still dangerously cold.

Jared Charbonneau got involved two-and-a-half years ago when his parents were working with 15th Night and they needed Youth Action Council members. On the council, Jared works with youth that have been homeless before and people that want to help the homeless.

"This is important to me because I don't like to see youth in our community struggling to survive because of situations that they were born into," Charbonneau said.

Junior Jordan Lee is helping lead the fundraiser for 15th Night at Marist. Juniors Libby and Whitney Korh are spokespersons for the fundraiser.
