Marist swim wins combined team title at the 4A/3A/2A/1A SD3 district meet

"It was pandemonium on deck. Everyone was jumping, yelling, screaming," swim coach Ryan Elliot said.

Freshman Kyler Lajoie, freshman Jackson Anderson, junior Ryan Watts and sophomore Trent McQuaid all posted PRs for their respective legs of the relay, earning Marist 32 points and the highest team score at the district meet.

"It was crazy. Just a huge benchmark in the season that set us up good for state. The energy was too much," Anderson said.

Marist spent most of the meet trailing Salem Academy; their only first place finish was the 400 Yard Freestyle Relay.

"The boys did it. I don't know how to say it any other way," Elliot said.

McQuaid also finished second in the 200 Yard Freestyle and 500 Yard Freestyle to give

Marist a nice 26 point boost.

Anderson finished second in the 200 Yard Individual Medley with Lajoie close behind in third.

Boy Spartans heading to state are junior Hudson Jarvis, senior Wiley Watts, Anderson, Lajoie, McQuaid and Ryan Watts. They will compete in two relays and four individuals.

The girls' side was marked by great individual and relay performances. They finished second overall.

Sophomore Sofia James and seniors Lauren Barry, Aubrie Ellison and Katie Thompson took second in the 200 Yard Medley Relay.

Barry also placed first in the 50 Yard Freestyle and third in the 100 Yard Freestyle.

Ellison was the top individual performer for the Spartans with a first place finish in the 100 Yard Butterfly and a second place finish in the 100 Yard Backstroke.

Ellison is now preparing for her final trip to the state meet. "I'm trying to keep my mind off everything ... I'm trying to get into the mentality to just race and do my best," she said.

Girl Spartans heading to state are junior Abby Salnas, senior Lily Fitzharris, James, Ellison and Thompson. They will compete in three relays and five individual events.

Next Fall, senior Colin McCarthy will be joining the eSports team at Northwest Christian University to compete in the multiplayer online video game, League of Legends.

NCU was the first collegiate team in the state of Oregon to offer athletic scholarships for eSports. Currently, they offer scholarships in four different games: League of Legends, Rocket League, Hearthstone and Overwatch. In the near future, they will also be looking to add Fortnite Battle Royale to their lineup of gaming options.

The Beacons eSports team is one of just 115 teams in all of America that offer athletic-scholarships to highly-skilled gamers.

The rise of eSports has seen an exponential increase in viewership over the past few years. In 2019, 380 million people around the world actively watched and/or competed in eSports.
