Through his leadership within campus ministry, his teaching of countless students in Christian Leadership Classes, or his forming of the Marist Retreat Team, pieces of his legacy can be found everywhere throughout the school.

He recently accepted the position of Director of Marist Adult Evangelization Ministry for the Marist Province, USA, and will be leaving at the end of the school year. Martin wouldn't have left Marist for anything except a once-in-a-lifetime opportunity to work alongside the Marist Brothers. "If I didn't have the opportunity like I got, I would still be staying at Marist." After this school year, Martin and another long-standing staff member, current Assistant Principal of Student Life and Culture Stacy Baker will be working for the Marist Province, USA. Martin is currently the Director of Campus Ministry and Formation. He started as a full-time theology teacher in 1988 before being offered the position of Campus Minister at the end of his rookie year. Martin's "craft" as Ferrari put it can be narrowed down to his careful approach to his delicate work. Between his leadership and teaching, Martin always took a very intentional approach.

Whether teaching or running retreats, he spent lots of time deciding the best way to present material to his students, and even if his plan wasn't going the

way he wanted it to, he adapted and overcame. Martin's commitment to the faith and leadership formation of others is a very admirable quality.

Another Marist colleague who worked closely with Martin for a long time is Andy Oldham, the Assistant Principal of Teaching and Learning. "He embodies exactly what the school strives to be," Oldham said. "The Marist we see today, at its best, can likely be traced back to something he was involved in."

Martin impacted Oldham on a personal level. "His calm, centered, and thoughtful approach to the world around him is very admirable," said Oldham, who is taking over the CLC program next year.

First-year theology teacher Jack Kiesewetter '15, who was one of Martin's students, had a lot to say about Martin. "Dr. Martin's work with the Retreat Team and CLC were hugely

foundational to my development as a teacher, servant leader, and retreatobsessed individual," Kiesewetter said.

Kiesewetter is heavily inspired by Martin to continue his path within faith formation. He is now training to take over the Marist Men's Encounter. "In developing retreats, his example of being a humble servant inspires me to this day," said Kiesewetter when describing working together with Martin on retreats.

Dr. Martin has made an impact on the entire school and the thousands of students and staff who have filtered through it. Marist wouldn't be where it is today without him, and there is absolutely no doubt that he will be greatly missed by everyone.

"The impact he has made on our school in many different areas is profound and there is no way that it can be replicated," said Ryan Moser, a longtime colleague and friend of Martin.



Marist Tennis brings home both tennis state team titles, one singles, and one doubles title.

Last Thursday, Friday, and Saturday, both the boys and girls won the OSAA 4A/3A/2A/1A State Championships at Oregon State University after both winning their districts the week before. The girls team won for the first time since 2021, and the boys, who were the defending State Champions, won the big trophy again. The boys scored 38.5 points and the runnerup, Oregon Episcopal School, had just 24. The girls team scored 20.5 points and there was a four-way tie for second place with 10 points.

Outstanding performances by the boys at state include sophomore EJ Roedl who won the state singles title and sophomore Alexander Ricketts who took down the No. 4 seed before losing in the quarterfinals.

In the doubles competition, seniors Peyton Tyner and Andrew Forsyth won the boys doubles state title in a three-set championship match. Juniors Will Barsotti and Burkeley Knight-Sheen finished as state semifinalists. Junior Cohen Aguero and sophomore Eli Mildren fought off nine match points to complete the biggest comeback of the tournament that advanced them to the quarterfinals where they lost to the No. 1 seed.

Senior Asher Pellegrini and

freshman Griffin Scoble battled their way through the consolation bracket before losing to St. Mary's in the semifinals.

On the girls side, freshman Whitney Hedden, the #3 seed of the singles bracket, ended up beating Bailey Bell of Philomath to win 3rd place in state. Sophomore twins Phoebie and Stella Larson were also very successful in the doubles bracket and placed 3rd overall. Senior Haley Ross and Talia Tyner were semifinalists for girls doubles.

During their seasons, the boys only lost one match and the girls were undefeated.

Three school records broken in one season

The OSAA 4A State Championship meet took place at Hayward Field on May 17-18. Eighteen Marist athletes ran, jumped, and threw for a combined 12 different events.

Clotine Chase was the lone spartan to win a state title and at the same time she set a new school record in the long jump with a distance of 18-2.25.

Chase was also a part of the girls 4x100m team that took 2nd along with juniors Piper Van Buskirk, Kate Firth, and Bella Gubrud. The four runners set a new Marist school record at state with a time of 49.44, which was one whole second faster than their previous first place finish at state two years ago.

The girls 4x400 team earned 7th place in finals. The team consisted of Braunger, junior Emma Hart, Kfoevsinyuy and Sherman. The boys 4x400 team, which included senior Dennis Jackson Jr. and freshmen Coen Rushton, Drew Grenade, and Conner Harvey finished 7th in finals but moved to 6th when one team was disqualified.

Three athletes competed in the 3000m. Junior Conor Thompson placed 5th and freshman Corbin Sage placed 8th in the boys race. Freshman Lucy Shah placed 5th in the girls race.

Field event competitors included seniors Kaylynn Guevara who took 11th place in the javelin and Zakiya Newman who placed 10th in discus and 11th in the shot put. Prior to state, Newman broke the Marist shot put school record in a meet at Jesuit High School with a throw of 39-6.5. The athletes qualified for state based on their performance at the Sky-Em District Meet, which took place at North Bend on May 10-11. The top two in each event districts automatically qualify for state and others earned a wildcard spot based on their times or distance at districts.



Lavoué both competed in the 100m. Gubrud took 4th in finals with a time of 12.77 and Lavoué just ran in the prelims. Gubrud also ran in the 200m and finished 5th with a time of 26.07.

Freshman Tori Sherman competed in the 800m and ran a 2:23.09 that placed 5th in finals. Junior Ella Braunger and freshman Cheryl Kfoevsinyuy both competed in the 400m prelims.

Individually, junior Christian Guerrero placed 4th, shooting a 158 over two rounds and junior Nick Hudson placed 9th with a score of 164. Senior Anthony Angelastro, junior Jaxen Mazur, and junior Logan Phillips shot 165, 172, and 202 strokes respectively.

Reddy and Thomas were also key components of the team's success during their journey to the state championship. At the 4A/3A/2A/1A special district 3 tournament, Reddy was crowned the district champion and Thomas placed 3rd.
